The experts

PROFESSOR DAVID GILLATT



Urologist, Professor Gillatt is recognised as one of the world's foremost robotic surgeons in the treatment of both prostate and bladder cancers, having performed more than 2000 major resections in his career. He also has expertise in the discovery and optimisation of biomarkers for early prostate cancer diagnosis and prognosis, and in the effect of ketamine abuse on bladder function. Before joining Macquarie University Hospital, Professor Gillatt was Clinical Director of Urology at Southmead Hospital and Medical Director of the Bristol Urological Institute, where he established the Prostate Cancer Care and Research Centre. The centre has gained a national and international reputation as one of the foremost research organisations for urology in the UK. It integrates teaching, research and clinical practice in urology. Professor David Gillatt has taken up the permanent positions of both Professor of Urological Oncology and Robotic Surgery and Director of Medical Services at Macquarie University Hospital. He will provide leadership across both the Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences and Macquarie University Hospital in the delivery of clinical services, teaching and research.

DR JASON KAPLAN



Cardiologist, Dr Jason Kaplan studied Medicine at UNSW and graduated with Honours in 1999. He then completed his Internal Medicine Training at St George and Prince of Wales Hospitals and Adult Cardiology training at Royal Prince Alfred Hospital. Prior to training in cardiology, Dr Kaplan completed additional advanced training in medical oncology and pharmacology. Dr Kaplan has also completed additional training in cardiac imaging in Australia and has spent time at the MAYO clinic in Minnesota, USA. He performs transoesophageal echocardiography, pharmacological stress (dobutamine) echocardiography and has brought the use of contrast echo and strain imaging to Macquarie University Hospital. He is an accredited specialist in Cardiac CT and personally evaluates all his patients' scans. Dr Kaplan has been a part of the team bringing minimally invasive robotic cardiac surgery to Macquarie University providing 3D echocardiography services to peri-operative patients and is part of the Structural Heart Disease team at Macquarie University assessing patients prior to minimally invasive cardiac procedures. He also has a strong interest in Sports Cardiology – an emerging subspecialty within cardiology. Dr Kaplan is currently Clinical Lead of Cardiovascular and Respiratory Medicine at Macquarie University and is a clinical lecturer in Medicine and Cardiology in the Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences.

PROFESSOR SIMON WILLCOCK



Professor Willcock is a general practitioner and the Director of Primary Care at Macquarie University Hospital. His education and research interests include the health of doctors and generational change in the medical workforce.

Professor Willcock is the Chair of the Avant Mutual Group and a board member of the Sydney North Health Network, the NSW Doctors' Health Advisory Service and a member of the NSW AMA Council of General Practice.

ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR KEN HO



Associate Professor Ken Ho is a Consultant Physician and Endocrinologist with clinical and research interests in Diabetes, Obesity and General Endocrinology. He trained at St George, and Bankstown hospitals and researched at the Garvan Institute of Medical Research. He

previously received a full-time National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) scholarship and other diabetes grants for his PhD studies on the role of iron chelation for the treatment of glucose, lipids and obesity. He received the Novartis Young Scientist award from the Endocrine Society of Australia in 2009. His research was published in the Journal of Clinical Investigation in 2010. He currently holds Visiting Medical Officer and Staff Specialist appointments at Ryde, Macquarie University, Campbelltown and Camden teaching hospitals in Sydney. He provides medical governance for the high risk foot service at Camden hospital. He is a Clinical Associate Professor with the Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences at Macquarie University. He is currently supervising three research scholars for their Doctor of Advanced Medicine program through the faculty. He has published in the areas of diabetes, vitamin D, and general endocrinology. He teaches from undergraduate through to post-graduate medical, and Physician training. He is the Director of Physician Education and the Chairman of the General Clinical Training Council at Ryde Hospital. He has presented lectures to GPs, optometrists, pharmacists and the general public on diabetes, thyroid disorders, pituitary disorders and osteoporosis. He has previously received letters of appreciation and commendation from the Northern Sydney Local Health District and the Lions Club of Sydney Chinese Society for his public lectures.
